CROP Walk Provides Aid Locally and World Wide

This month's Disciple Gift focus is CROP, most commonly associated with the CROP walk held every April in Warrensburg—and all across the country.

CROP walks are sponsored by Church World Service and organized by local congregations and groups to end hunger at home and around the world.

A unique aspect of CROP Hunger Walks is that the money raised is divided between Church World Service and the local community. Of the funds raised in the Johnson County CROP Walk, 25% will go to The Food Center and 75% is designated to support global programs to end hunger and poverty and promote peace and justice—in Ukraine and the other 30 countries in which Church World Service works.

The Bible Never Said That: If You Have Faith, You Won't Suffer

Does the Bible promise us that if we have faith we won't suffer? Psalm 22 begins with a cry of frustration to God: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" The author of this psalm describes feeling abandoned by God as he suffers physical and psychological suffering. He remembers that God was faithful to previous generations, but he doesn't experience this faithfulness as he is mocked by others as he goes through a time of public suffering and embarrassment.

We never learn the details of what the author suffered, and we never learn if this suffering ended.

What we do learn from the psalmist is that he never gives up on God. He continues to abide in God and God abides with him. The promise of Psalm 22 is not that faith in God will bring a miraculous end to suffering but that God will be faithful to us even while we suffer. That God will bring us into final deliverance. The psalm concludes with these words:

Posterity will serve him;
future generations will be told about the Lord,
³¹ and proclaim his deliverance to a people yet unborn,
saying that he has done it. Psalm 22:30-31

How to Read Scripture: Experience

How many of us have known good people who have experienced great pain? Have you ever sat with one of your friends or family members going through a hard time and thought to yourself, "What did they do to deserve this? This just doesn't seem fair?" When I was a hospital chaplain at Children's Medical Center in Dallas, Texas, I saw incredible testimonies of faith among families that were experiencing great suffering.

One afternoon we received a call asking if a chaplain could go to the waiting room in the neurology department. There was a family that was very upset. I met a young mother and her husband who were in agony. Their daughter was being treated for a brain tumor. The mother's father had been driving to visit them in the hospital when he was in a fatal car accident. The first thing she asked me was, "Why? Why would God let this happen?" Like the author of Psalm 22, she was asking, "Where was God in her time of need?"

For the next several weeks we prayed together many times for God's steadfast love and grace to be with their family, the medical team, their daughter. We gathered around her daughter and prayed for her at 4:30 before surgery one morning. On another day we gathered together with 20 members of their extended family in the hospital chapel and prayed and listened to God. I witnessed their family facing the unknown, fearing the worst, becoming angry with God, and then remembering God's covenant with them, and drawing on his strength as they moved through one of the hardest chapters of their life together.

How to Read Scripture: Jesus Interpreting Scripture

How does Jesus answer the question, "Does having faith in God mean that we won't suffer?"

In the context of the gospel of Mark, Jesus tells his disciples many times that he himself will suffer on account of sharing the good news of God's love and forgiveness. He also tells them that they will suffer as his disciples.

Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. ³²He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' ³⁴ He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. Mark 8:31-34

Could it be that Jesus is showing us through his life and words and use of scripture that even the most faithful suffer? That while God never promises us a life free of suffering God does promise to walk with us in our darkest nights and bring us to freedom on the other side?

The family that I walked with in the hospital experienced pain and loss, but they also grew in their faith and relationship as a family as they faced these challenges together.

I've seen couples going through the pain of marital problems and stress in the home draw closer together through the knowledge of Jesus' abiding presence with them.

Many of us here today are experiencing pain. Know that your suffering doesn't come from a lack of faith. We all suffer, even those who have great faith. Know that God is with you. God walks with you in the pain. And in ways that we may not understand or expect right now, God will bring you deliverance on the other side.

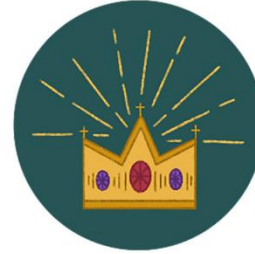
