

Reverend Laura Murphy's message notes from Feb. 27, 2022

Six Words

As a pastor and representative of the Missouri United Methodist Foundation, the favorite part of my work is hearing people's stories. After all, everyone has a life story that can impact another person's life.

Have you thought much about your life story? Have you thought of writing it down, or how you want it told? My guess is that most of us don't write down our life story because in the thick of life, we don't realize the story we are living is significant enough to share. Consequently, we let the opportunity slip away, losing the precious moments we've been given to share it with the next generation.

But what could happen if we got to work at writing down our life stories? Do you think it could change the way we see our lives, and better yet, how others see our lives? Could it change who we become? Could it make an impact on future generations?

When we take a moment to look back at the stories of people in the Bible, I doubt any of them thought their stories were significant enough that people would still be talking about them centuries later. But it's by hearing their stories the significance of their lives unfolds. It's the same for us. Life stories reveal something powerful that others can learn from. For example, there is a profound lesson in how when a person's life intersects with God's story, their life story changes forever.

Think about the stories of Abraham, Noah, Daniel, the prodigal son, the woman at the well, the blind man, Matthew, and Paul...just to name a few! Their lives were all interrupted by God as they recovered from something difficult, finding restoration and hope. Here we are thousands of years later, still learning about how by the grace of God, there is new life for all of us—especially when faced with hardships and challenges.

I am so thankful that we can learn from these people's stories, as well as others who have gone before us. Their life stories have become their legacies. After all, a legacy is something conveyed from one person to another, passed down from one generation to the next.

Too often people think of a legacy as being a financial gift, but really our material wealth is only a small fraction of our legacy. Leaving a legacy is far more about sharing what we have learned, not just what you have earned. It's about bequeathing values over valuables. Legacy is about telling our story in a way that others can glean hope and faith in the messy world around them.

Today I challenge you to think about your life story and how it becomes your legacy. Think about how others can learn from what you've experienced. Think about how—by the grace of God—things are different than what you ever expected them --Rev. Laura Murphy



March's Disciple Gift: Helping Hands

Acts 20:35 *In everything I did, I showed you that by this kind of hard work we must help the weak, remembering the words the Lord Jesus himself said: 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.'*

As **FIRST** supports our local community with **HELPING HANDS**, **FIRST** also supports **UMCOR**.



Helping Hands is the overarching committee that encompasses three mission efforts to help those in need: UMCOR/Disaster Response Team, Job Squad and the Ramp Crew. **Helping Hands** interfaces with **FIRST's** leadership when seeking assistance--whether it be funds, logistical support or other actions needs to support the envisioned activities.

Emergency Response Team (ERT) supports UMCOR and deploys within the U.S. ERT deploys only after receiving a call for assistance from the Missouri Methodist Conference. Members must be UMCOR trained before deploying. Deployments are typically five days (Day 1: travel, Day 2-4: work, Day 5: travel) but can extend, as needed. The teams are self-sufficient bringing their own equipment, meals and sleeping gear. Typically, lodging is coordinated with a Methodist church near the work area(s).

Job Squad supports **FIRST's** family and the local community. Anyone can join to help others...no training, no auditions... just you! We provide a "work crew" to do non-technical, non-professional work in and around the house the owner may not be able to perform. Examples include raking leaves, trimming shrubs, cleaning gutters, and...shoveling snow. If you need assistance, contact **FIRST's** office and explain the work needed. The office will forward the request and you will be contacted by the **Job Squad** to determine if the work is within their skill range and coordinate a possible work time.

Ramp Crew is restarting **FIRST's** relationship with West-Central Independent Living Solutions (WILS). Previously, **FIRST** provided work crews and equipment while WILS provided materials to build ramps in six counties, including Johnson County. Today, we are coordinating with WILS and hope to build our first ramp this spring. Bob Muir graciously agreed to assist in the ramp's design, determine needed materials and only "supervise" the ramp's construction. Anyone can help! We had an energetic group of volunteers--**FIRST's** adults and youth, college students and Whiteman AFB personnel--and hope to rebuild this team who made an impact to many people's lives. If you can cut wood, screw nails or want to help, please contact **FIRST's** office.

The offering will support the education and training of deaconesses and home missionaries and, also, retired deaconesses.




