The church office will be closed Monday May 30, for Memorial Day.



I Believe!

On May 24, 1738, John Wesley went to a Bible Study on Aldersgate Street in London where he heard a reading from Martin Luther's commentary on Romans. He wrote in his spiritual diary, "I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt that I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for my salvation."

Wesley went on to found the United Methodist movement that has inspired millions of people to give their lives to Christ over the past two and a half centuries across the globe. It is our prayer that by reflecting on the spiritual journey of Wesley's salvation, we can better understand our own salvation with God and trust even deeper in the Holy Spirit.

Who hosted this Bible study where Wesley experienced God's assurance of salvation? It was the Moravians, a group of German pietists who sent out missionaries to spread the good news of Jesus across the world. In 1722 a group of Christians fled from Bohemia and Moravia to escape religious persecution and settled in a town called Herrnhut, which means "The Lord's Protection."

Assurance

This experience troubled Wesley profoundly. Here he was, a clergyman of the Church of England who had dedicated his life to bringing new people to faith in Jesus and yet in the moment of crisis, he felt fear and doubt. He felt that he lacked assurance in his faith in Jesus. He doubted the assurance of his own salvation. The question of assurance troubled him but ultimately probably drove him to a deeper understanding of faith and spiritual maturity. Even though John Wesley was an ordained minister in the church of England and a professor at Oxford University in Theology, people of all different backgrounds, races, and education levels witnessed their faith in God to him. One of the qualities I admire about John Wesley is his sincerity of faith, his desire to know God more deeply throughout his life, and his belief that God could speak through other people to him. He sought out the testimony of other people's faith and would record their words in his diaries. John Wesley

was inspired by others.

Don't we have the same opportunity to inspire each other in our faith?

Members of this church have helped me to grow in my trust and confidence in God over the years. I've sat with many of you in hospital rooms and in your homes when

A nobleman named **Count Zinzendorf became** the patron of this religious community. They organized themselves into groups or choirs to encourage each other in faith. They dedicated themselves to worship and especially to music. They focused on the image from scripture of Jesus as the lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. They opened an orphan school that would house 650 children and educate



3,000. They came to feel that they had a particular calling to witness to Christ among people who did not know Jesus. They sent out missionaries starting in 1732 to the West Indies, in 1733 to Greenland, and to South Africa and North America in 1736.

John Wesley himself was a missionary as a part of the church of England and set sail for the colony of Georgia in 1735. On the voyage Wesley spent time discussing faith, singing, praying, and sharing the Lord's Supper with Moravian missionaries headed for the new world. John Wesley learned German to understand their hymns and prayers.

When a storm threatened to sink the ship and all on board, Wesley was scared for his life. He writes in his journal that he was shocked to see the Moravians calm, joyful, singing hymns and praising God with the assurance that their salvation was secure. Whether they lived or died, they trusted in God's grace and salvation. you're nearing the end of life or have received the news of the death of a loved one. I've been with you during job loss and the loss of opportunities. The trust and confidence in God you've shown me has helped me to grow deeper in my faith.

Paul encourages us to trust in God in all circumstances writing,

"For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 8:38-39

At that Bible study on Aldersgate Street, the young John Wesley who needed guidance and direction experienced a deep assurance in God's salvation. He wrote in his diary, "Now I truly trust in God alone."


