The monthly mission for May focuses on Survival Adult Abuse Center, which has been a part of Warrensburg for 40 years.

Formed in 1982 by a group of concerned citizens in Johnson County, Survival House initially provided emergency shelter and a crisis hotline for victims of domestic violence. It became quickly apparent that more services were needed.

Funds raised support the free and confidential services for victims of domestic and sexual violence. They also go towards things such as replacing identifying information, transportation, medication, groceries, and other items clients may need.



The Spiritual Life of Middle Age

One of the exciting things about this life is that there are special challenges and opportunities as we age and grow. We aren't just individuals going through the world alone. The amazing message of Jesus Christ is that we are invited to be a part of God's family, a family with many different generations. For our lives to be full and abundant, we need to have deep, meaningful relationships with people of all different ages. One of my goals in this message series is to help us all explore how much more rich our spiritual lives will be when we intentionally cultivate relationships with people of all different ages. By discussing each of the different stages of life in sequence, it's our hope that we can cultivate better understanding of ourselves and the different generations. Today we will be discussing together the middle-aged years, ages 30 to 59.

I asked people on Facebook to share their thoughts on the opportunities and challenges of living through your 30s, 40s, and 50s. My former swim coach, Paul Murphy, wrote, "As you get older by the decade the one question that always comes up is what's next?"

Ages 30 to 40 You are still digging your heels in and figuring out where you are in life, family, relationships. You have more responsibility and less time. These are the years many people choose to get married. Our bodies are able to bear children. You have the energy to raise kids, which as many of you know is really saying something.

Ages 40 to 50 There is an expectation to be solid. Our bodies change and kids become more independent.

Ages 50 to 60. You ask yourself, "Where do you want to be after the kids leave the house?" Career? When are you done? You are reestablishing your relationship with your partner, God, friends, and spouse. You are reconnecting yourself spiritually. These are the years of great opportunity.

Gabrielle Benedict, who is in her 30s, recently went to a training in Charleston with the Air Force Reserves. She had a chance to explore the historic city and visit family. She bought a pistachio ice cream and thought to herself, "I get to eat this all myself...but I kind of wish my kids were here with me."

As I've talked with my friends in their 30s and 40s and 50s, these are the years that we are in demand. The opportunity and the challenge of these years is to maintain correct priorities. The challenge of this stage of life is that we can feel disoriented by the many different voices asking us to invest our time in various areas.

In the context of this discussion, the words from Ephesians chapter 4:14 speak to the challenge we have in hearing and following God's voice: We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming. Ephesians 4:14

The middle age years can be disorienting when you aren't clear about your goals. Where our student years are focused on exploring and gathering new perspectives, our

middle-aged years can be disorienting if we are not intentional about the choices we are making.

*Movement from one career path to another can be a wonderful thing if done for the right reasons, but this can also be a way of avoiding the responsibility and maturity that comes with experience and age.

*Our marriages can be strained if our commitments aren't firm to our spouses and families.

*Our identity can become confused if we aren't regularly investing in building up our community.

*Our identity in Christ will become confused if we don't invest regular time with Jesus and other believers.

Each of us is ultimately a child before God and in constant need of direction, encouragement, and grace. We should always be reviewing and remembering the most fundamental elements of our faith in God, but we also have a responsibility to seek continual maturity in our understanding.

How do we maintain God's priorities and develop the maturity?

Invest time in the things that Jesus shows us are important through his life.

Jesus would wake up early to listen to God. This is a stage of life to spend time in silent prayer every day asking God to help us discern where we are called to invest our time. Spend time talking with people who have more experience than we do.

Make time to rest and be with the people you love.

Chuck Linville, our facilities manager, got divorced when his son was young. He made sure that they were together every weekend. For ten years they spent Saturday and Sunday together fishing, playing catch, enjoying time together. They attended church with his brother and his wife and would have BBQs where his son could play with his nephews. In those ten years, they only missed half a dozen weekends together.

Taking the sabbath requires us to trust in God and that our careers and the world will keep moving without us. It's a time to let go of the need to always be in control and producing, which is the temptation of the middle age years.

One of the reasons Jesus' church is so important is that it is the body through which we develop relationships with people of different ages that can help us to better understand where we are in our journey of faith. Children remind us of the importance of play and the joy of God. Those who have more years and more experience can share with us the wisdom they have accumulated in their spiritual lives and help us to learn for ourselves the priorities that God is setting for our lives. Enjoy the sabbath. Take a day to be with God, the church, family, and friends. Let go of work and delight in the life God has given you. The work will be there when you get back. You will perform better. Slow down enough to have time to develop relationships with people of different ages.
