Discover something new about UMCburg

Church family connection Stronger than politics

The battle of Lone Jack's history is UMCburg's history. Recent research has revealed that both the commanders of North and South at Lone Jack were members of our congregation, and the Church played a pivotal role in one of the bloodiest Civil War battles of Missouri.

The reverberations of which later had a national impact on the healing process of reconstruction and were even partially responsible for the election of Harry S. Truman in 1945.

To celebrate the important contributions of our church, the Lone Jack Historical Society has created a special exhibit, which will be unveiled to our congregation in a private tour and picnic at the Lone Jack battlefield and museum on October 1. The following is a short preview of some of the church's history that will be unveiled for the first time ever during the tour:

In charge of the Union troops at Lone Jack was Major Emory S. Foster, son of one of the first pastors of our congregation, Robert A. Foster. Rev Foster served in Emory's company as Chaplain.

Leading the Confederate troops was another pastor of our congregation, Colonel J. Vard Cockrell. The Foster and Cockrell families were lifelong friends and Methodist circuit riders who ministered and worshipped together as brothers devoted to God.

As the fabric of the country crumbled into divided loyalties, the Methodist Church also split in two. The Fosters and Cockrells staunchly disagreed on the issue of succession, but initially both families remained with our small burgeoning congregation they had created together and became what was known as the "Southern Methodists."

After the murder of Rev Foster's oldest son by a pro-secessionist at the outbreak of the war, the remaining Foster men left to fight for the Union, while the Cockrells joined the Confederacy.

In August 1862 the former friends met in battle at Lone Jack as enemy commanders. During the fight, Maj Foster was shot from his horse. Days later as he lay on the brink of death in the field hospital, a messenger sent word to Col Cockrell that an assassination plot on Maj Foster's life was forming.

Cockrell raced back to Foster's side at Lone Jack where he wept and prayed over his former Methodist brother in Christ, swearing to protect him.

Col Cockrell then commanded a group of rebels led by Cole Younger to stand guard over Maj Foster day and night. Acting on Cockrell's direct orders, Younger physically fended off the assassin that evening, saving Foster's life as promised.
